Cultural memory, cultural practices and ethnic identity among a minority group at Lake Abbaya, Ethiopia:

Within the framework of language and culture endangerment, this PhD project deals with a case that shows how cultural change among former hippopotamus hunters from Gidiccho Island in Lake Abbaya (Ethiopia) determines their inevitable decline as an ethnic group. While other cases demonstrate the intensification of traditions in times of ongoing change (cp. Piot 1999: 23f, 173), and while language groups in Ethiopia have the right to claim political recognition (see Dereje and Meron 2015), this research investigates particular reasons and practices explaining why the Haro people seek no distinction to the surrounding more dominant ethnic neighbors. Results will provide a recent case study for minority studies in Ethiopia (see also Pankhurst and Freeman 2001), and offers a contrasting light to culture heritage studies as well as to indigenous rights movements.
