







During the past four decades an impressive corpus of manuscripts epigraphical material in Thailand, Laos, and adjacent Tai-speaking areas has documented, surveyed, and digitized. Scholarly interest in this material has not been restricted to philological and historical studies of the texts contained in manuscripts and inscriptions but has extended to its material aspects, which encompass manuscripts written on palm-leaf, various forms of paper,



cloth, bamboo, and other organic material, and inscriptions on stone, metal, and wood.

In Manuscript Cultures and Epigraphy of the Tai World, Volker Grabowsky seeks to explore the production, use, and transmission of manuscripts both as containers of traditional knowledge and as objects used in daily life, rituals, and ceremonies. Particular emphasis is given to the relationship between manuscripts and inscriptions, as both have influenced each other to no small degree. # Conference on Book History and Thai Literary Studies at Kasetsart University

(Bangkok, Thailand)

The National Research Council of Thailand, along with the Faculty of Humanities, Kasetsart University and the Asien-Afrika-Institut, Universität Hamburg, organised a national conference on book history and Thai literary studies at Kasetsart University in Bangkok on 25 February 2023 to discuss the study of book history in Thai context, as well as its application to Thai literary studies. Six papers in different topics ranging from manuscript and print cultures to modern readership were presented and discussed in this whole-day conference. Prof. Dr. Volker Grabowsky from Universität Hamburg attended the conference as a co-host, while Peera Panarut, a postdoctoral researcher from Universität Hamburg, presented his paper on colophons and book history of Phra Malai illustrated manuscripts. •

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## **Austronesian Studies** The Philippines

"You are listening to Tinig Pinay Radio Program, handog ng philippinische Frauengruppe, Hamburg."

It is with those words - in English, Filipino and German - that the radio program organized by the Filipino community in Hamburg starts. Junior Professor of Austronesian Studies Elsa Clavé and her students have become regular hosts for this Tinig Pinay Radio Program which takes place every 1st and 3rd Thursday of the month from 8-10 pm and can be listened to on 93.0 FM, 101.4 MHz cable, or through a direct link at www.fsk-hh.org/livestream. It is hosted by FSK (Freies Sender Kombinat), which is supported by the City of Hamburg to foster cultural diversity among communities living in the city.

The program uses three languages, namely German, Tagalog (Tagdeutsch) and English, but plays only songs in Tagalog or other vernacular languages of the Philippines, with a wide range of genres speaking to different generations. Started 20 years ago, as a way for the first generation of the Filipino diaspora to answer a certain nostalgia from home, the program will now be periodically handled in cooperation with graduate students from the Austronesian program, together with Jun-Prof. Dr. Elsa Clavé (every 3rd Thursday of the month). They will bring the "voice of the Filipina" on air, with topics including diaspora, migration,



Asian-German, gender inequality, and popular culture. Among the future guests are Filipino nurses, academicians, second generation Filipino-Germans, but also a chaplain, sailors, and women activists. For song requests, greetings, and topic suggestions, you may contact:
