

ABSTRACT: This presentation aims to provide a comprehensive overview of sacred places (jiares) among Kurdish Alevis in Dersim, focusing on a pilgrimage site named Kemerê Duzgı. For centuries, Kurmanci and predominantly Kırmancki speaking Kurdish Alevi communities of the Dersim region have practised the Raa Haqi belief system. My ethnographical studies indicate that, even though the traditional socio-religious networks have long collapsed, jiares have intriguingly sustained the continuity of the religion by helping to maintain religious practices, discourses, ethno-politics and symbols in everyday life. Kurdish Alevis keep believing in Dersim as an ancestral sacred land and sustain new religious-political discourses by referring to mostly nonhuman entities today, such as mountains, rivers, lakes, forests, wild animals, etc. More specifically, jiares produce unique connections with mystical beings through various forms of personal-religious experience, which is now the dominant way of conceptualising Kurdish Alevi ethnic identity.
